Children's back-and-forth interactions from an early age form the foundations for language and cognitive development.)</p>	<p>Personal, Social and Emotional Development</p> <p>Select and use activities and resources with help when needed.</p> <p>Making friendships.</p> <p>Co-write and begin to follow class rules.</p> <p>Talk about their feelings using words such as sad, happy, angry or worried.</p> <p>(Children's personal, social and emotional development (PSED) is crucial for children to lead healthy happy lives and is fundamental to their cognitive development. Underpinning their personal development are the important attachments that shape their social world. Children should be supported to manage emotions, develop a positive sense of self, set themselves simple goals, have confidence in their own abilities, to persist and wait for what they want and direct attention as necessary.)</p>		<p>Physical Development</p> <p><u>Gross Motor</u></p> <p>Cooperation games i.e. parachute games.</p> <p>Climbing - outdoor equipment.</p> <p>Different ways of moving to be explored with children.</p> <p><u>Fine Motor</u></p> <p>Dough disco and squiggle while you wiggle.</p> <p>Threading, cutting, weaving, playdough.</p> <p>Making marks using gross motor movements</p> <p>Hold and use pencils/paint brushes.</p> <p>Funky Fingers</p> <p>(Physical activity is vital in children's all-round development, enabling them to pursue happy, healthy and active lives. Gross and fine motor experiences develop incrementally throughout early childhood.)</p>
